Hailed by Opera Wire as an artist "imbued with fiery relish", soprano Michelle Allie Drever is delighted to return to Pocket Opera, where she previously sang Violetta in La Traviata. Other credits: the Queen of the Night (The Magic Flute), Lucia (Lucia di Lammermoor), Donna Anna (Don Giovanni), Le Feu (L'Enfant et les sortilèges), and Rosalinde (Die Fledermaus) at companies including Utah Lyric Opera, West Bay Opera, LA Opera, and Miami Lyric Opera. She holds a master's degree in vocal performance from the UCLA Herb Alpert School of Music and is an alumna of the Renata Scotto Opera Academy under the direction of Renata Scotto.



Alex Boyer Mario Cavaradossi

Alex Boyer is steadily gaining recognition for his commanding voice and dramatic portrayals of the lyric and spinto tenor repertoire. Hailed by the SF Chronicle for Festival Opera's I Pagliacci, Boyer "mustered a large, potent sound that brought a welcome measure of anguish and dark menace to the role of Canio; his delivery of the famous showpiece 'Vesti la giubba' lacked nothing in the way of grit and vocal power." Recently, he has been seen as Cavaradossi in *Tosca* with Livermore Valley Opera, Tichon in Janáček's Káťa Kabanová with West Edge Opera, and as Captain Ahab in Moby Dick with Chicago Opera Theater.



Spencer Dodd Baron Scarpia

Baritone Spencer Dodd's Previous roles include Don Giovanni and Leporello in Don Giovanni, Figaro and the Count in Le nozze di Figaro, Dandini in La Cenerentola, Belcore in L'elisir D'amore, Friederich in Wagner's No Love Allowed and Tonio in I Pagliacci. He has performed with the San Francisco Opera Chorus, West Edge Opera, Pocket Opera, Opera Together outreach with San Francisco Opera, Classical Romantic Concerts in Osaka Japan, and Ars Minerva. Recently he has also sung in recordings for Gordon Getty's Operas. This fall he will be singing with the San Francisco Opera chorus in Lohengrin and Il Trovatore.



Jordan Eldredge Angelotti

Bay Area native Jordan Eldredge holds a Bachelor of Music from San Francisco State University. Having sung in his first Pocket Opera performance in 2002, Jordan is a Pocket Opera veteran. His Pocket credits include Falke in *Die Fledermaus* (2017), Papageno in The Magic Flute (2014), Masetto in Don Giovanni (2013) and Baron Douphol in La Traviata (2010). Jordan is thrilled to be returning to the stage after a multi-year hiatus.

After 35 years as a child psychiatrist, Gene retired to reinvent himself as a singer. Since 2014 he has performed Handel's Messiah more than a dozen times throughout the Bay area. He performs regularly with Cinnabar Theater (The Magic Flute, The Most Happy Fella, Man of La Mancha, La Traviata); Pocket Opera (Roberto Devereux, Semele, La Traviata); Verismo Opera (Tosca, Das Rheingold, Aida, Faust); and Bay Shore Lyric Opera (Aida).
